Seventy-five years ago, a brochure announced:

"ONE OF THE GREATEST EVENTS IN THE HISTORY of Protestantism will take place at Lake Forest, August 16 - 20, 1950, when the churches of the Biennial Council of Community Churches and the churches of the National Council of Community Churches come together in one great merging convention."

Now that 75 years have passed, the International Council of Community Churches is returning to its birthplace at Lake Forest College, July 22 - 24, 2025, to celebrate its 75th Anniversary Annual Conference. You are invited! Come join us to celebrate our past and move us into our future!

Our theme this year is "Seeking God's Vision: Remembering the Past, Dreaming a Future." For 75 years the ICCC has been seeking God's unity and reconciliation, so for three days in July we will gather to explore how the ICCC has done that over the last seven plus decades, how we are doing it today, and dream how we will answer God's call to do it in the future.

Our opening day, Tuesday, July 22, will remember our past. This day will feature a historic display of pictures and items from our history, memories from past leaders and long-time conferees, and a video tribute to our history. That evening will be an Anniversary Buffet and a 75th Anniversary Worship Celebration in the historic sanctuary of First Presbyterian Church of Lake Forest, across the street from the college. Worship that evening will include Rev. Donald Ashmall, ICCC Council Minister Emeritus, as preacher; the celebration of Holy Communion; and a processional of ICCC clergy.

Our second day will focus on our present, including auxiliary meetings, presentations on our current ministries and missions, workshops, a delegate business session to approve a revised constitution, and evening worship.

Our third and final day on July 24 will look at the future. Many events on this day will be led by our southside Chicago ICCC churches.

Make plans now to join us in Lake Forest "where it all began," for our celebration of 75 years of seeking God's vision of unity and reconciliation.



Soon Christians around the world will celebrate Resurrection Sunday (Easter). Preachers will declare and people of the pew will affirm that Jesus is "The Lord of Life!" Together we'll lift our songs, prayers and praises to the one in and through whom God conquered the "last enemy which is death."

I find myself wondering why we declare and, ostensibly, believe that Jesus is the "Lord of Life" while constantly and consistently taking life decisions – existential and eternal – as the church's arena of authority. The church, in its wide variety of ecclesiastical shapes, doctrinal forms and composed theologies, has intentionally and sometimes malevolently made decisions that belong to the one who is, by God's grace, the "Lord of Life."

The church, in its various manifestations, has ruled itself to be the arbiter of truth, the broker of holy authority, the "decider" of the matrix for life, here and in the hereafter. The result? Instead of working, serving and ministering towards the fulfillment of Jesus' prayer that we may all be one, the church has become a source of division, hostility, and estrangement. The institutional church decides who can receive God's love, grace and mercy. The church has decided the proper and godly shape of love between human beings. The church has decided, in its incredibly finite wisdom, that it knows fully and completely the infinite wisdom and will of God. Even though Jesus said, "I have sheep that are not of this fold and I will bring them in," the church has declared Jesus wrong because only those we deem to be "elect" make it into the kingdom which belongs exclusively to God.

Jesus, the Lord of Life, declared, "I am the way, the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except by me." (John 14:6) Why can't the church accept the face value of what Jesus said? The Lord of Life is the WAY! The Lord of Life is the TRUTH! The Lord of Life is LIFE! The Lord of Life is the DECIDER, not the church!

In her book, *Holy Envy: Finding God in the Faith of Others*, Barbara Brown Taylor relates the story of New

Testament scholar and Orthodox Jew, Amy Jill Levine. She writes,

When someone asks her (Levine) for her interpretation of John 14:6, she says that she imagines herself at the pearly gates after a long and happy life. While she is waiting in line with everyone else to see if Peter will let her into heaven, she makes a list of everything she wanted to ask him while she was still in the classroom: "Can you speak Greek? Where did you go when you wandered off in the middle of Acts? What happened to your wife?"

When it is finally her turn to talk to Peter, she starts pelting him with so many questions that he just waves her through. This concerns the next person in line, who has heard of Dr. Levine and knows she is a Jew. "Excuse me," the guy says to St. Peter, "but I don't think she's supposed to be here." That is when Jesus sticks his head through the gates and says, "It's fine, Peter, I know her and she's okay by me." *GET IT*? "No one comes to the Father but by me, and she's okay by me." Levine's point is that no one enters the presence of God except by God's grace. No church, no church doctrine, no individual gets to referee that. Where the Way of Jesus is concerned, he is the Decider.

Jesus is the Lord of Life! Jesus is the Way! Jesus is the Truth! Jesus is the Life



These thought-provoking titles, highlighted in Publisher's Weekly, offer valuable insights for believers seeking spiritual growth, justice, and deeper biblical understanding.



Micro Practices for Justice Ministry: Doing Little Things for the Common Good. Tex Sample. Abingdon Press, \$19.99 trade paper (192p), ISBN 978-1-7910-1242-3

Tex Sample (*Blue Collar Resistance* and *The Politics of Jesus*) presents a practical and accessible guide for faith leaders committed to justice. He illustrates how relationship-building,

self-care, and community engagement can create lasting social change through small but meaningful actions. From real-life clergy experiences, Sample provides an actionable framework that aligns with ICCC's mission of faith-driven social justice.



The Bible Says So: What We Get Right (and Wrong) about Scripture's Most Controversial Issues. Dan McClellan. St. Martin's Essentials, \$30 (320p), ISBN 978-1-25034-746-6

Biblical scholar and "Data Over Dogma" podcaster McClellan challenges common misinterpretations of scripture, offering historical and textural


analysis on contentious religious topics. He explores misunderstood symbols (such as 666), reinterprets debated teachings, and examines how scripture has been used to justify modern biases. A thought-provoking resource for readers seeking a deeper, historically grounded understanding of biblical texts.



What If I'm Wrong? Navigating Through the Waves of Fear and Failure. Heather Thompson Day. Thomas Nelson, \$19.99 trade paper (224p), ISBN 978-1-4003-4157-3

Author Day (*It's Not Your Turn*) delivers a heartfelt reflection on faith, doubt, and resilience. Inspired by her father's battle with Alzheimer's,

she reconsiders long-held beliefs about suffering and divine justice. Through personal stories, she explores themes of risk, struggle, and spiritual growth, offering encouragement for those navigating uncertainty in their faith journey.



Pilgrim: A Theological Memoir. *Tony Campolo,* with Steve Rabey. Eerdmans, \$23.99 (272p), ISBN 978-0-8028-8494-7

The late pastor and activist Campolo (*Connecting Like Jesus*) shares a deeply personal account of his evolving faith. He recounts witnessing racial injustice as a youth, challenging conservative evangelical norms, and

his later advocacy for LGBTQ+ inclusion. His reflections also critique the politicization of faith in modern America, offering a bold and introspective look at Christian ethics.

This hotel is about 5 miles from the Lake Forest College campus and is the closest hotel to the college.

The ICCC has a courtesy block of rooms at the special rate of:

- \$159 plus tax for a king room or
- \$169 plus tax for a double queen room.

These rates are good from Sunday, July 20 to Friday, July 25. The deadline to receive this rate is Sunday, June 15, or until the hotel sells out of rooms, whichever is first.
